REFLECTIVE ESSAY Turned ARTICLE ASSIGNMENT & CHECKLIST

In a reflective essay, the writer reflects on a topic, with the focus on the big ideas / values / beliefs / issues / experiences in life. Usually the essayist will use a formal tone to explore this issue, but with 1st person "I" or "We" as a POV. The essayist wants to explore the issue / experience / idea from many angles before finally declaring a resolution, having an epiphany or realization. This type of paper is designed to get readers to think about the bigger ideas in life and our place in society, and in particular, how music helps to shape us; social commentary music in particular gets us to reflect on our experiences in a ways that hit us to the core. So this type of article is both about the power of that kind of music and you reflecting on your own experience with such a song. So, you, the writer must try to engage the reader with examples which illustrate your point but which can also be relatable to the reader and their experiences.

PROCESS

- 1. Brainstorm a list of songs that are personally meaningful to you over the course of your life.
- 2. Choose one and listen to it over and over tracking you emotional, physical, and intellectual response on the aesthetigram.
- **3.** Look over your aesthetigram and make notes on each part you circled, what experiences, thoughts, ideas were going through your mind? Write them down.
- **4.** Plan the outline for your essay, using the template and model.
- **5.** Draft the essay.
- **6.** Get the essay peer-reviewed AND add in notes for revisions and your headline ideas and rhetorical devices
- 7. Format the essay to look like an article cut up your essay paragraphs into shorter chunks, revise content and add in rhetorical devices, and a catchy headline and subhead.
- **8.** Peer review the article and make obvious notes on draft for revision AND label all the techniques and devices you used
- **9.** Produce the good copy
